Welcome to the first Border Watch Member News for 2021. This edition includes updates from your regional Coordinators, and real stories about Border Watch and the Australian Border Force (ABF) in action.

As we adapt to the 'new normal', we also feature an important update about COVID-19 vaccine imports, and changes to the temporary export control covering personal protective equipment.

Achieving real results

Between July and December 2020, information provided to the Border Watch program can be linked to the detection of:



Over **115 kilograms** of border controlled drugs (BCDs).



More than **58 million** cigarette sticks, worth over **\$62 million** in potential lost revenue and GST.



Over **13 tonnes** of rough cut tobacco and **5 tonnes** of molasses tobacco, together worth over **\$27 million** in potential lost revenue and GST.

Border Watch members have played a key role in preventing these drugs and smuggled goods from entering the country.

We take all reports of suspicious activity seriously and all reports we receive are acted upon.

Delivery driver helps disrupt plot to import molasses tobacco

In September, a delivery driver working for an express freight company attempted to deliver two air cargo consignments to a residential address, but the occupant said the consignee did not live there. Soon afterwards, the consignee contacted the express freight company and gave authority to leave the consignment at a different address.

A manager at the freight company thought this behaviour was suspicious and reported it to Border Watch. The ABF examined both consignments and located 33kg of molasses tobacco from Indonesia. Officers seized the goods and issued a notice to the importer, effectively disrupting this attempt to exploit border controls.

Importing molasses tobacco for commercial or personal use, without obtaining a permit and paying the relevant duty and GST is a criminal offence.

If you work with cargo, be on the lookout for:

- Last minute change to details, such as delivery addresses;
- Deliveries to a residential address or selfstorage facility;
- Goods weight inconsistent with goods description;
- Consignee business inconsistent with goods described on the manifest.

Cocaine filled vessel seized off NSW coast

On 11 March 2021, approximately 200 kilograms was seized after it was allegedly located on board a vessel off the New South Wales coast. The detection resulted from a joint operation between AFP, ABF and NSW authorities.

Through Maritime Border Command, ABF officers provided ongoing monitoring of cargo vessel as it made its way to Sydney. Aerial surveillance observed the launch of a small vessel that met with the cargo vessel.

Police allege that 11 crates containing 199 blocks of cocaine were offloaded from the cargo vessel and transported to the smaller vessel where is was intercepted by NSW Police Force on its return to shore. The seized cocaine has an estimated street value of \$90 million.

If you live or work near the coast, be on the lookout for:

- vessels anchored or operating in an unusual area;
- vessels meeting at sea with other vessels;
- vessels operating without navigation lights, departing at unusual times or in unsuitable weather conditions;
- vessels damaged on return to the dock;
- vessel operators who lack knowledge about local conditions or lack ability to operate their vessel;
- unusual activity on beaches or in remote areas (such as hidden campsites or fuel dumps).

COVID-19 vaccines

The ABF is working with the Therapeutic Goods Administration (TGA) to ensure goods, including COVID-19 vaccines, medicines and medical devices can enter Australia as quickly and efficiently as possible, while meeting import requirements.

Registered COVID-19 vaccines can only be imported by the Sponsor listed on the <u>Australian</u> <u>Register of Therapeutic Goods</u>.

Be on the lookout for people trying to import unapproved or counterfeit vaccines, or import legitimate COVID-19 vaccines without approval. It is possible that some criminals may seek to 'piggyback' the details of legitimate COVID-19 vaccine importers, in order to move illicit goods into Australia.

Remember, vaccines have special storage requirements (for example, the Pfizer vaccine needs to be stored at minus-70 degrees Celsius), so be particularly vigilant around cold chain or temperature-controlled goods.

Export control repealed

Regulation 13GI and regulation 13GJ of the *Customs (Prohibited Exports) Regulations 1958* have been repealed. On and from 11 December 2020, it is no longer prohibited to export certain goods that help prevent the spread of COVID-19, including disposable face masks, gloves, gown, goggles, glasses or eye visors, alcohol wipes and hand sanitizer.
